While deciding not to enter the plan proposed by Dr. Ira J. McCurdy for a community athletic park, the Kiwanis Club went on record in favor of steps being taken by the city to acquire land for the development of a memorial park in Frederick. The property suggested by Dr. McCurdy for a community athletic park is located on Jefferson street, and it was estimated that about \$20,000 would be required to buy the property, erect a grandstand and board fence and equip the ground for sports for the general use of the community. The Baseball Association would rent the diamond for games.
