Key Club Plants a Tree

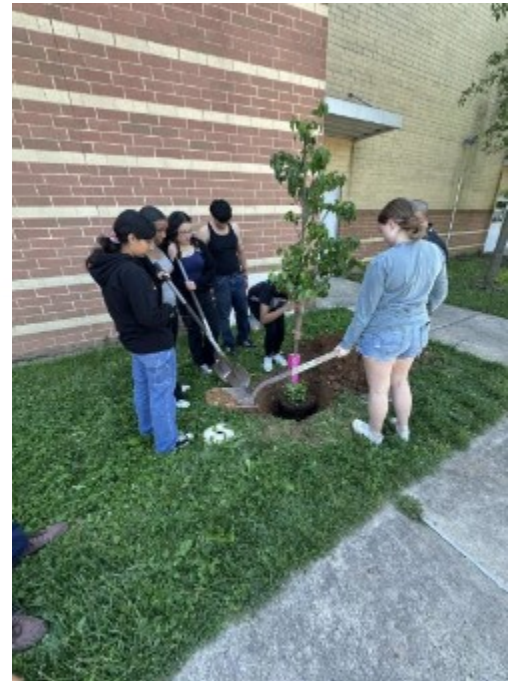

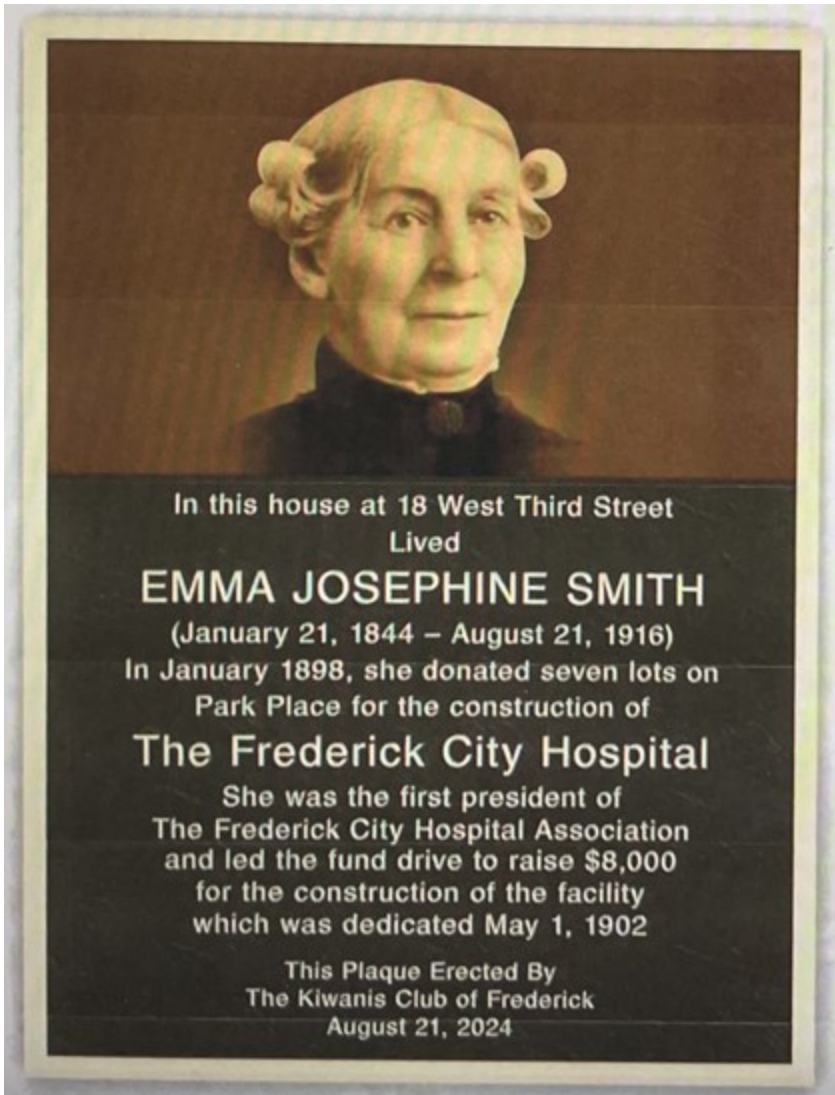

Her vision—along with the generosity of the Frederick community—led to Frederick Health being built on a solid foundation of philanthropy. Not only was Emma the first president of the hospital, she generously donated the land on which Frederick Health resides, and she worked tirelessly with her dedicated group of women to raise the \$8,000 needed to open the original hospital. "

Whaling Log Donated by Richard Cutting

This has nothing to do with Kiwanis. I just think it is real cool! Richard Cutting is donating the Caleb Eaton's Whaling Log book from 1879. The Caleb Eaton was a 110 ton schooner with Thomas C. Gifford as master. It departed New Bedford, MA on Nov. 1, 1879 on a 4-year whaling expedition to the Pacific ocean and never returned. It had returned to San Francisco in March 1884 to begin another whaling voyage but was crushed in the Arctic ice flows on July 17, 1884 and never made it back to New Bedford.. Pictured here are a few pages from the log, a slightly off-colored poem entitled "The Key Hole in the Door," some sketches and a sketch of a model of the Eaton. — Dave

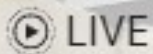

Remarks on board, Sch. Calib. Eaton 1879

Saturday Nov 1st

We are all ready for sea, at 9.30. AM
Pilot come on board we then hoove up anchor
made all sail and left the City of
New Bedford bound on a whaling voyage
to the North and South Atlantic Ocean
in pursuit of Spirm and Right whales, the
Tug Boat Charley accompanied us a few
miles on the way and at 3.30. PM the Pilot
along with the rest of the Company left us and
went back in the Steamer Charley and
we stood along to the Southward and Eastward
So ends our first day out
from Home " "

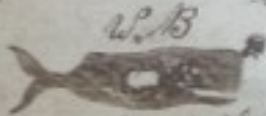
Saturday Nov. 8th

Experienced very heavy gale of wind with
heavy rain squalls from the N.W. we
were in the S.W. Edge of the stormy regions
of the Gulf Stream

Saturday " Dec. 6th

this day light breeze and fine weather
at daylight saw Spirm whales, at 7.30
AM lowered all three Boats. W.B. struck
and got one S.B. struck two but got Nix
the Harpoon drawn from one and the line
parted from the other at Noon took the
whale along side then got dinner and then
Commenced cutting in and finished at
dark So ends this day of Our
Lord " "

Remarks on board Scl Calcutt Oct 18 51

Thursday Aug 11
Comes in with fine weather at 7 am
finished balling lowered S. and W.B.
to cruise vessel lying at anchor the
men on board stowing down Oil at 7
P.M. Boats come on board now whale
to day, but had heavy thunder show
as usual between the hours of 5 & 7 P.M.
rest of the Day fine weather. so ends

Friday Aug 12
Lying at anchor at day light
lowered S and W.B. to cruise for whales
at 4 P.M. W.B. struck in a rain squall
got the whale turned up at dark whale saw
Boat lay by the whale all night, the other
Boat was not in sight nor the vessel either
the hatch being shut in by the rain at the
time of striking. so ends this day.

Saturday Aug 13
at day light Calm saw the fast boat
from the vessel lowered S.B. and sent it
to the whale W.B. crew went on board and
got breakfast and then turned in for a
sleep at 11 am got light breeze hove up
anchor set sail and started for the whale
at 1.30 P.M. Cow and calf came up close to
the vessel lowered W.B. and struck but
the iron drew and we lost the whale
at 4 com to anchor along side of the whale
whale hauled him up and commenced
cutting finished cutting at midnight, the
boat's eat about 25 Bbls of Oil from

Remarks on board Sch. Vessel Eaton 1882
Cruising around the Galapagos Isls

Thursday May 25

all this day strong breeze from the Southward and Eastward. Standing to the Eastward. at 10:30 AM raised large white water 2 points off our lee Bow and 7 miles off. we run towards it and it proved to be Spium Whales. at 1 P.M. lowered all three Boats the S.B. went on to a whale and S. King the Boatsteerer missed him good Chance S.B. went on next and Manuel the Boatsteerer missed (Boat on top of the Whales) back). S.B. went on again but the Capt went in the head of the boat and struck the whale himself and got him. about ten hours later S.B. went on again. King got one Leon in slightly and it came out (another good chance gone). W.B. went right on struck and got one. took the first whale alongside about 4 O'clock PM last one at sundown. got supper and set the watch for the night. watch on deck getting ready to Cut. So ends the day

Friday May 26

Commences with light breeze from the S.E. vessel lying aboe. at 5 AM called hal hands and commenced cutting in the Whales and got them in by 11:40 AM. in the afternoon busy cutting blubber and clearing away the Heads. at 7 PM started Try Works S.S.E. So ends
