Local nonprofit unveils plaque dedicated to founder of Frederick City Hospital

A small crowd gathered outside 18 W. 3rd St. in Frederick on Wednesday morning watched Frederick Health CEO Tom Kleinhanzl and Mount Olivet Cemetery Superintendent Ron Pearcey remove a piece of cardboard from a newly installed plaque on the building.

The plaque features a portrait of a woman who residents might not know, unless they work at Frederick Health Emma Josephine Smith, who spearheaded the creation of the Frederick City Hospital Association and Frederick City Hospital.

Kleinhanzl read the plaque's wording to the audience. Members of the nonprofit Kiwanis Club of Frederick, which funded the project, and county and city officials were among those who attended.

The building at 18 W. 3rd St. was Smith's former home. In 1898, she donated 50,000 square feet of property she purchased to build the city's first hospital, the plaque said.

Smith was the first president of the Frederick City Hospital Association and led the fundraising of \$8,000 to construct the hospital, which was dedicated in 1902.

Although Smith's name is known in Frederick Health Hospital, a marker of her legacy, it's not as recognizable to the community, according to historian John Ashbury.

Ashbury used to be part of the Kiwanis Club and was part of efforts to erect the plaque after learning about her through reading an article about her by Chris Haugh, who works at Mount Olivet Cemetery.

Smith died in 1916 and is buried in a family plot at Mount Olivet.

When Ashbury discovered Smith's achievements and her long-lasting legacy, he was surprised to see there wasn't any commemoration for her at her former home.

He brought the idea of erecting a plaque for Smith to a friend who is still in the Kiwanis Club, who took it back to the club. That was back in January.

I pushed to have this done, but today is Emma Smith's day, and whatever I did was for her," Ashbury said. "This is the first recognition of Emma Smith outside of the hospital. She was be able to know about her."

The Kiwanis Club had approached the current residents at 18 W. 3rd St., Chrisse Bowers and Al Bassett, to discuss putting up Smith's plaque.

Bowers said she and her husband had no idea that Smith lived in that building until the club and Ashbury told


Those recognize included 24 swine projects, 10 steer, 9 lamb, 3 goat and 3 rabbit.



The Art & Julane Andersen "Steadfast" & "Playground" stories

Julane and I made annual contributions to Religious Coalition (now called Beyond Shelter) Beginning Feb 8, 2022 and completed in March 2024 which paid for the attached playground system (see next page) that was installed at the Emergency Family Shelter at 7516 Hayward Road. We also made one or more contributions toward the restoration of the Historic Hayward-White Farm House to bring it up to standards as a temporary home for homeless families.

Also, in 2024, we were introduced to the staff of "Steadfast" (see below) which is a group home for young men who have been in foster care and after aging out became vulnerable to becoming homeless. Steadfast provides more than housing for these individuals. They receive life skills training and other counseling to help them stay out of homelessness. We provided monetary support for operating the group home for the past two years.

The History of Steadfast by Cindy Morgan, Founder / Executive Director

During this time, the realization of the link between foster care and youth homelessness became increasingly evident. Within 18 months of emancipation 40-50% of foster youth become homeless. The rising concern I had for my Child In Need of Assistance (CINA), my appointed foster care youth, who at age 18 was soon to sign himself out of the system after four years of living in Residential Treatment Centers, was matched by the same concern of CASA volunteers Nancy Wilson, Margaret Gaines and Cary Plamondon for their CINA youth of similar ages. Their youth wanted out of the system also, with no family, minimal support, and no place to go. As our concerns began to rise, so did our awareness of the increasing unaccompanied homeless youth population in Frederick County and the critical need for safe and stable housing.

In 2018, with the vision firmly planted, we joined forces and together set out to formulate the framework of Steadfast. We formed a Board of Directors and in June of 2019 Steadfast was granted 501(c) (3) status. Today, with the help, hard work, dedication and generosity of an amazing group of people, we opened our doors in May 2023. And here in 2024 we have youth in our home, attending schools, working in our community, and striving to make changes in their lives for a promising and hopeful future!
